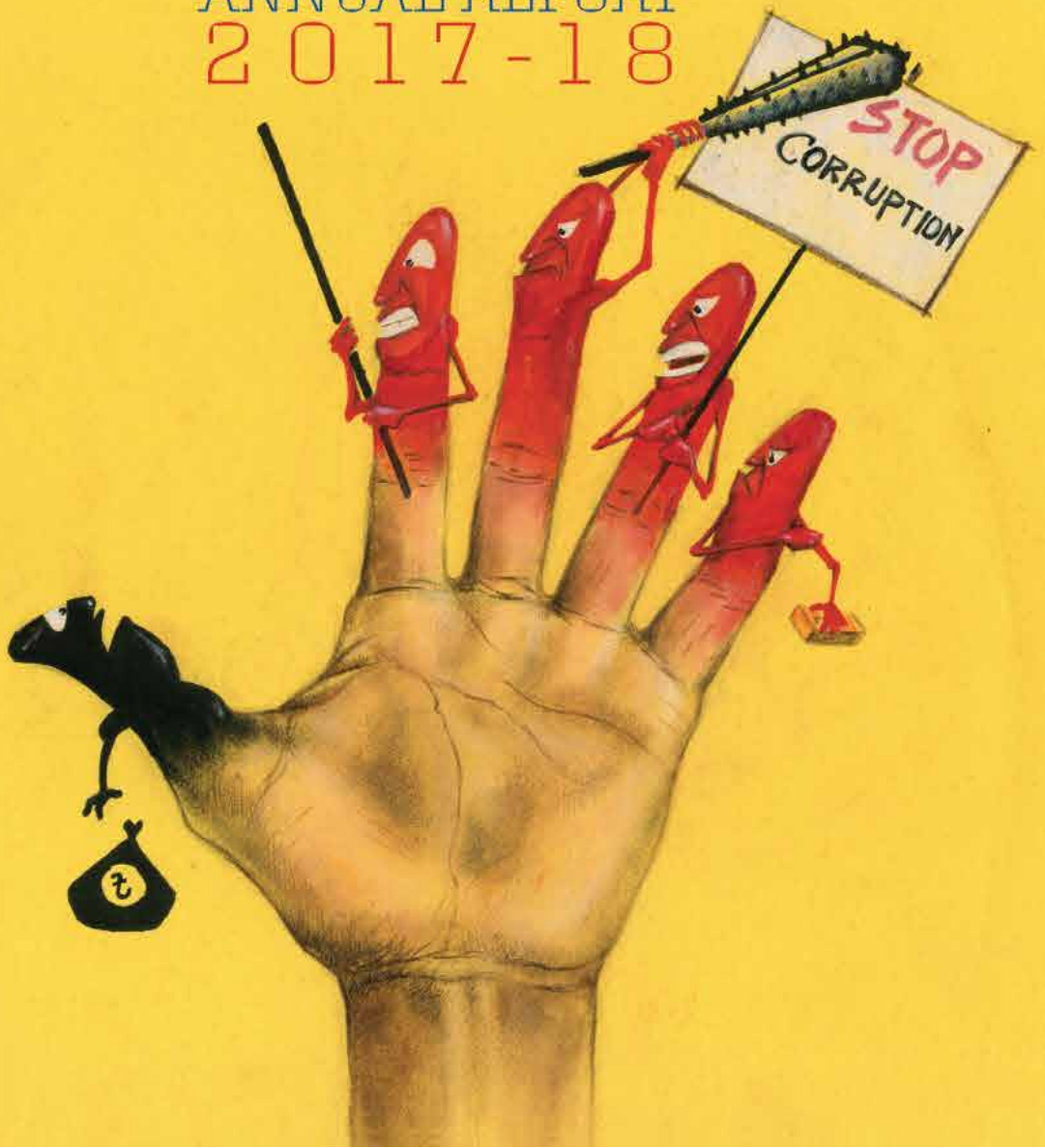

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FOREWORD

It is a special privilege and pleasure to present this annual report which is brief account of yet another fulfilling and challenging period of twelve months for Transparency International Bangladesh (TIB). We have successfully delivered our mandate of contributing towards strengthening institutional, legal and policy capacity to prevent and control corruption in Bangladesh. We have also survived and successfully navigated multiplicity of challenges that we confronted on the way as usual.

This report presents a snapshot of activities and achievements of TIB in the year 2017-18 under our core comprehensive project “Building Integrity Blocks for Effective Change” (BIBEC) which steps into it's fifth year from October 2018. I take the opportunity to express our deepest gratitude to Department of Foreign and International Development of UK, Swedish International Development Agency, Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation and the Danish International Development Agency for their continued trust and confidence in us and generous support. The reporting period witnessed cutting-edge research on a number of sectors and institutions, the findings of which have been instrumental in placing corruption on the political agenda and pushing for institutional, legal and policy reforms on the one hand and strengthen and sustain the demand side for higher levels of integrity, accountable governance and anti-corruption on the other. In spite of often being visibly targets of denial syndrome of a section of the power-holders, TIB has been successful in working with the government as well as political and other stakeholders towards strengthening the potentials to promote integrity in governance and prevent and control corruption.

We remain grateful for the wide range of cooperation and support we have received from the Government during the year at both national level as well as in the districts and upazilas where TIB has been operating in 45 locations through multiple citizens platforms led by Committees of Concerned Citizens (CCCs) and Youth Engagement and Support (YES) groups. Thanks to increasingly active engagement of people and especially the youth volunteer groups at the local level, TIB has catalysed improved governance and anti-corruption good practices in selected institutions and sectors, which have been reinforced by various capacity building initiatives that helped amplify and replicate some of our good practices in sectors and institutions beyond institutions and areas of our direct coverage.

We have been convinced once again that with passion, perseverance and impeccable credibility of our work, even the hardest of challenges can be converted into opportunities for positive change. We have made significant progress, but we have a lot more to do towards realizing our vision of a Bangladesh in which government, politics, business, civil society and the daily lives of the people shall be free from corruption. By achieving higher levels of credibility and excellence of our work coupled with enormous support of the people of Bangladesh which continue to inspire us on a daily basis we are confident of steadier and more visible progress towards fulfilling our vision. WHO WE ARE

Transparency International Bangladesh (TIB) is an independent, non-government, non-partisan and non-profit organization with a vision of Bangladesh in which government, politics, business, civil society and the daily lives of the people shall be free from corruption.

In the context of the international movement against corruption, as the fully accredited national chapter in Bangladesh of the Berlin-based Transparency International (TI), TIB partners and cooperates with TI and its chapters worldwide.

Values

TIB is committed to values of democracy, justice, rule of law, transparency, accountability, integrity and impartiality.

Mission

TIB's mission is to catalyze and strengthen a participatory social movement to promote and develop institutions, laws and practices for combating corruption in Bangladesh and establishing an efficient and transparent system of governance, politics and business.

Goal

The goal of BIBEC is to promote a more enabling environment for reducing corruption and its objectives are:

- To advocate for reforms in laws, policies, processes, practices and oversight for improving governance in targeted institutions and sectors.
- To generate peoples' demand for good governance and strengthen citizens' capacity to challenge corruption.

Approach

TIB uses a three-pronged approach in its work. It engages in:

- Research for knowledge-based advocacy aimed at law/policy reform;
- Engagement with local level stakeholders for generating demand for transparent, effective and accountable governance; and
- Outreach and communication for fostering citizen's support and building networks, alliances and partnerships for driving the anti-corruption movement.

EVIDENCE BASED RESEARCH

The robustness of TIB's research continued to be recognized by stakeholders in shaping the direction of national anti-corruption agendas. Outreach and policy initiatives, during the reporting period also contributed to informing people on pervasiveness of corruption, amplifying demands for improved transparency and accountability in relevant sectors and institutions. Our unique approach of identifying type, magnitude and causes of corruption and recommendation(s) for reforms and change have resulted in some successful and ongoing legal and policy measures and practices.

ADVOCACY INITIATIVES

Int'l Anti-Corruption Day

The Cabinet Division recognized 9 December as the International Anti-Corruption Day (IACD). The day was jointly observed in 64 districts by TIB, ACC and Deputy Commissioners.

Department of Immigration and Passports (DIP) Barisal division took specific measures such as installation of complain box, help desk, regular public hearings and citizens service centers for elderly people, persons with disability, and freedom fighters.

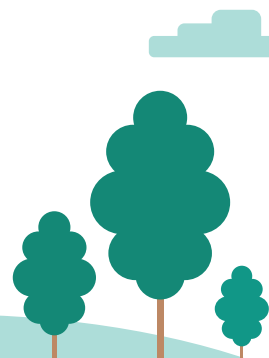
Ministry of Education (MoE) called for reverification of CAG's audit objections on National Curriculum & Textbook Board (NCTB) in December 2017.



A2i shared portfolios of their digital applications and platforms to explore the impact of digitalization on corruption in February 2018.

Ministry of Education (MoE), and Ministry of Primary and Mass Education (MoPME) ordered to shut down coaching centers ahead of exams in February 2018, and decided to introduce a software based 'question bank' for the next exams.

Ministry of Land shared its existing measures and projects for improving transparency and accountability in the Land sector in May 2018.



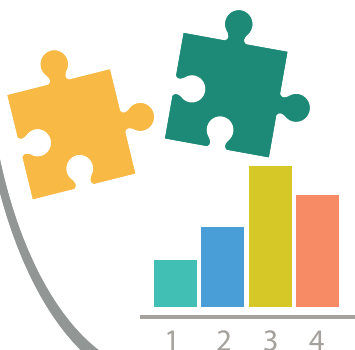


Ministry of Expatriates' Welfare and Overseas Employment initiated a complaint management cell for expatriate female workers which was set up at the Bureau of Manpower Employment and Training (BMET) for addressing complaints from female migrants.

Shah Amanat International Airport Authority Chittagong initiated information disclosure and complaint redress mechanism; monitoring of security staff of Civil Aviation Authority of Bangladesh (CAAB), increased use of security machineries.



Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change (MoEFCC) took an initiative to revise the Bangladesh Climate Change Strategy and Action Plan (BCCSAP) with feedback from different stakeholders.



The Office of the Comptroller and Auditor General of Bangladesh directed the Directorate of Local and Revenue Audit on 7 February 2017 to include seven most corrupt sectors in its Audit Programme on a priority basis following the findings of TIB's 'National Household Survey 2015' released in June 2016.



The Ministry of Land circulated several directives to improve governance and reduce corruption through proactive disclosure of information in land offices. The Cabinet took a decision that permission would be required from concerned authority for the use of land for any development or industrial purpose. The government also formed a committee on May 28, 2017 to re-fix land price and registration fee in the wake of huge revenue loss.



CLIMATE FINANCE GOVERNANCE (CFG)

- TIB's recommendation about stakeholder engagement has been adopted in the final version of the sixth review of the UNFCCC financial mechanism at COP 23.
- A new framework to create and assess Governance Standards in Climate Adaptation Finance has been piloted in the Maldives and Bangladesh and the UNDP has expressed interest in adopting the new framework/tools in their assessment of CFG.
- Challenges and prospects in meeting fiduciary, environmental and social standards for obtaining accreditation by potential National Implementing Entities (NIE) from the Green Climate Funds (GCF) were identified involving 26 NIEs including IDCOL and PKSf. To date, IDCOL and PKSf have got accreditation from the GCF.
- The Ministry of Finance has allocated around 300 crore BDT for the Bangladesh Climate Change Trust Fund (BCCTF) in the fiscal year 2018-19.
- The Ministry of Environment has carried out climate vulnerability assessment.
- The Ministry of Planning has revised the Development Project Proposal (DPP), integrating a separate section to examine the relevance of climate vulnerability; and prepared sector-specific climate budget along with the budget proposal for FY 2018-19.
- The BCCTF Trustee Board has entered into an agreement with the Implementation, Monitoring and Evaluation Department (IMED) to evaluate 27 completed projects funded by BCCTF.
- At least 70% of the issues raised by the citizens during public hearings were addressed by the implementing authorities.

Dhaka Integrity Dialogue 2



Experts from India, Nepal, Australia, the Maldives, the Netherlands, the UK, Thailand and Bangladesh convened in 'Dhaka Integrity Dialogue 2: Climate Finance and Governance in South Asia', to identify the prospect and challenges in climate finance governance and explore the potential scope, ways and means of regional efforts to meet SDG13 and the Paris Agreement in the context of good governance in climate finance.





CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

A key consideration of BIBEC is to facilitate a deepening of the work of TIB's Committees of Concerned Citizens (CCC), Youth Engagement and Support (YES) and their auxiliary groups (SWAJAN, YES friends and YPAC) and to focus on issues that have clear governance dimensions in the areas of BIBEC project intervention. TIB's efforts to engage people with duty bearers at 45 CCC areas through prudent application of social accountability tools and processes continued to positively influence delivery in five key sectors: health, education, local government, land and climate finance governance.

Active Mothers' Forums (AMFs) have been instrumental in improving governance in selected primary schools. Meanwhile, a number of service delivery institutions committed to promote gender sensitive actions e.g. setting up of breast feeding corners and separate information boards on women's services in health institutions, separate line and special allocation for women in LG budget, etc. As a result of intensive advocacy with district level sectorial authorities like DPEO, DD-LG and Civil Surgeon, a large number of Govt. Primary schools, Union Parishads and Health Institutions have developed specific action plans to reduce corruption and irregularities within their jurisdiction.

To proactively reach out to the people with information and guidance, Satellite AI-Desks were organised in public places, especially in schools, hospitals and local government offices. Public hearing sessions jointly organized with ACC and open budget sessions with concerned authorities have been proved to be beneficial in ensuring accountable and efficient services.

During the reporting period, a total of 390 complaints from 376 clients were received at the Advocacy and legal Advice Centre (ALAC), out of which 54.4% received legal advice, 24.1% received basic information and advice and 11.8% cases were referred to the relevant institutions for providing required support.

WHERE WE WORK



YOUTH ENGAGEMENT

TIB's year-long youth engagement programmes focused on motivating young people to raise voice against corruption. During the reporting period, YES and YES Friends, both in Dhaka and CCC areas spearheaded anti-corruption messages through different public awareness campaigns and initiatives, and organized diversified anti-corruption events marking several national and international days.

At the local level, eight innovative projects were implemented at Rajbari, Munshiganj, Brahmanbaria, Nalitabari, Gaibandha, Jamalpur, Kurigram and Muktagacha, focusing on inclusion of marginalized groups in UP allocation, developing awareness on climate finance issues, tracking the stipend and ensuring cleanliness at hospitals etc.

Various initiatives were undertaken in Dhaka and 45 CCC areas to promote enforcement of the Right to Information Act, 2009 (RTI), including hands-on training on RTI application, survey on the status of Designated Officers (DOs) and advocacy with the concerned authorities for appointment of Designated Officers (DOs). In response, around 99% of the targeted institutions have assigned DOs. In addition, about 3000 RTI applications have been received of which about 2500 applications were addressed by the DOs.

During the reporting period, two national debate competitions were organized by TIB to observe the World Water Day and International Women's Day. Meanwhile, 16 young debaters from 8 universities of the Maldives, Sri Lanka, Nepal, Bhutan and Bangladesh took part in a two-day long Westminster Parliamentary Style debate competition on the theme "Transparency, Accountability and Integrity: The Key to Ensuring Effective Mobilization and Use of Adaptation Finance" from 19-20 July 2017. Another international debate competition on 'Climate Finance and Governance - Engaging the Youth for Transparency, Accountability and Integrity' was organized, where eight teams from Nepal, Bhutan, Sri Lanka, the Maldives, Indonesia, Cambodia and two teams from Bangladesh took part.

A new drama titled "Chiching Fak" was developed for Dhaka YES theatre group through a five-day long workshop held on 10-14 February 2018 at TIB head office. Besides, a new choreography of TIB's theme song was also developed during the reporting period.

TIB marked the International Anti-Corruption Day (IACD) through a weeklong diverse set of events involving youth, including anti-corruption oath, rally, human chain, anti-corruption photography and cartoon competition and exhibition, moot court competition etc.

PARTNERSHIP

TIB's continued efforts to engage with prime stakeholders for joint interventions reached a new high during the reporting period. To begin with, TIB has signed Memoranda of Understandings (MoUs) with the Anti-Corruption Commission and Information Commission.

Moreover, TIB has successfully implemented 1444 joint initiatives with 273 government institutions at 45 CCC areas to mobilise citizens against corruption & irregularities by raising collective voices and making authorities more accountable to the citizens for their services and responsibilities.



30 investigators of the Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) of Bangladesh took part in a day-long training workshop titled "Effective Investigation of Corruption".



TIB organised a workshop titled 'Sustainable development goals, good governance and women' for female Upazila Nirbahi Officers (UNO) with assistance of the Cabinet Division, GoB.

MEDIA ENGAGEMENT

TIB values its strategic partnership with the media to influence public opinion and secure mass support for reform objectives. During the reporting period, various capacity building initiatives for journalists were undertaken to enable them to use advanced investigative techniques, to identify the patterns and practices inherent in corrupt activities.

Marking the International Anti-Corruption Day (IACD) 2017, TIB organized a media Dialogue on Investigative Journalism and awarded five journalists and four camera persons from print and electronic media the Investigative Journalism (IJ) Awards 2017. Meanwhile, three journalists received TIB Investigative Journalism Fellowship.

Independent Auditor's Report To the Board of Trustees

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Transparency International Bangladesh, which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2018, and the statement of income and expenditure, and statement of receipts and payments for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Bangladesh Financial Reporting Standards (BFRS), and for such internal control as management determines necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Bangladesh Standards on Auditing (BSA). Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis of our audit opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Organization as at 30 June 2018, and of its financial performance and its receipts and payments for the year ended in accordance with Bangladesh Financial Reporting Standards (BFRS).
